Explain:

Often, we think of Jesus as the Light of the World but in this Bible passage Jesus calls us all to be lights. He says that we should be like towns on top of the hill – shining our lights to all.

Why is it important not to hide a light under a bowl? Is the light of any use there?

What do you think this is saying to us?

Going deeper

Sometimes we tell people to let your light shine and not keep your talents hidden when we want them to perform well or do their best. This attitude can sometimes lead to a very proud and boastful approach to life.

Read the passage carefully – what are the 'lights' that Jesus is referring to?

NB the emphasis of this passage is the fact that WE are lights of the world and are called to shine that light in a way that everyone can see it.

Have a number of card light bulbs cut out that pupils can write (or draw) their thoughts and prayers on them

Jesus suggests that whatever we do it should be so that God is honoured. How do you feel about that? For some this will be very important for others it will not mean anything. Whatever our personal beliefs – the important thing is the attitude with which we do things. We shouldn't be doing good things just to make us look good (so often politicians or people in the public eye are accused of this) but instead we should do all that we do with a humble or servant like heart.

What do you think about this? How do you treat others when we are less proud and humbler? How does this help to make the world a better place for everyone?

Respond

Encourage the pupils to respond with their own prayers first and then if appropriate use the Lord's prayer.

You may want to write prayers or responses onto the light bulbs.

Or A Christingle that lasts

You will need: tangerines or oranges; red tape or ribbon; sticky tape; sharp knives; an apple corer; cocktail sticks; tin foil; small sweets or dried fruit; some sort of small Play-Doh sculpture of a human or other flat representation of a person

Make your own Christingle. Stick the red tape or ribbon around the tangerine or orange. Slice off a small section from the base so that the tangerine or orange stands up on its own.

Using an apple corer, create a space where a candle could go into the top of the fruit. Put the four cocktail sticks into the orange or tangerine, each bearing some fruit or small sweets, etc.

Sculpt your human figure from clay or Play-Doh or cut out a cardboard figure.





Talk about the symbols of the Christingle: God's red ribbon of love around the world and God's good gifts in creation. But this Christingle is not complete. God sent Jesus not just for a one-off visit, but rather God planned by the Holy Spirit to pass on his light to each and every one of us in every place. The light of the Christingle candle can go on forever if we become the candles! Add the human figure to your Christingle in the place the candle would normally go. We are to be the light now that brings God's love and healing to the world.

The virgin's name was Mary. ²⁸ The angel went to her and said, "Greetings, you who are highly favoured! The Lord is with you."

wondered what kind of greeting this might be. ³⁰ But the angel said to her, "Do not be afraid, Mary; you have found favour with God. ³¹ You will conceive and give birth to a son, and you are to call him Jesus. ³² He will be great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, ³³ and he will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; his kingdom will never end."

³⁵The angel answered, "The Holy Spirit will come on you, and the power of the Most High will overshadow you. So the holy one to be born will be called^[b] the Son of God.



Hopes & Dreams

Equipment: Paper strips, felt tip pens, sticky tape & scissors or a stapler. Print-out of the conversation between the angel and Mary.

Set-up: Start a few paper chains off, perhaps inside a gazebo, and place the rest of the equipment close by.

Suggested Instructions: Read the conversation between Mary and the angel Gabriel. Think about what the angel said, 'nothing is impossible with God.' Think about your hopes and dreams, however impossible they may feel. If you want to, you can write or draw them onto strips of paper, and then add them to the paper chain.

Explain:

This part of the Christmas story, where the angel Gabriel visits Mary, is often called 'The Annunciation'. Gabriel arrives to make an important announcement to Mary about her future.

How do you think Mary felt? How would you have gone about telling someone that they were about to become the mother of God's son?

'Do not be afraid!' – this seems to be the standard opening line for angels! Do you think we portray angels accurately? Look at some different paintings of angels and see if you agree with the artist's ideas.

Going deeper:

After Gabriel had made his announcement to Mary, she went to visit her cousin Elizabeth. Elizabeth was also expecting a baby and that baby would grow up to be John the Baptist.

What do you think Mary said to Elizabeth about her news?

Do you think she was panicking? Worried? Excited?

Mary Praises God

Share your ideas and look at some of the people that she might announce the news to first.

Read

Luke 2:8-20

And there were shepherds living out in the fields near by, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, On not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Saviour has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: you will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger.

Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying,

4'Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favour rests.'

¹⁵ When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, 'Let's go to Bethlehem and see

this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about.'

¹⁶ So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. ¹⁷ When they had seen him, they spread the word concerning what had been told them about this child, ¹⁸ and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds said to them. ¹⁹ But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. ²⁰ The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.

Explain:

Shepherds were not important people in society at the time that Jesus was born.

In fact, they were not just ordinary, they were the lowest of the low!

They spent all of their time with smelly sheep and, as a result, were not popular with others.

So, why did God choose a bunch of shepherds to be the first group of people to hear about his son's birth?

Why do you think we can be encouraged that God chose the shepherds to hear the good news first?

What does this tell us about God?

Respond

Reflect and consider God's choice of people to be the first to hear the news

about the birth of his son. We know that the shepherds were not considered important.

Think about the people in our nation and our world who are not considered important. (Link to World Map activity above). Remember them in your prayers.

Three Gifts

Weekly bible focus: Matthew 2: 1-12

Preparation

- Collect and wrap three gifts ensure that they are not appropriate for a baby that would be similar to the gifts given to Jesus by the Wise Men (perfume/aftershave, incense/oil burner jewellery)
- Ask children/families to bring in a small item to add to a Christmas gift box for the homeless – toothbrush, toothpaste, soap etc

Gathering

Once everyone is calm and the space is set up ready for worship you may want to start by lighting a candle.

Light the candle with these words: As we come together, we light this candle. If you are Christian, you may think the light is like Jesus, shining out everywhere. If you believe in God, you may think the light symbolises the presence of God in the world. If you are not sure about your beliefs, the flickering light may make you wonder about the existence of God. If you don't believe in God, the light may make you consider what meaning there is in the world. Or the candle may have a particular meaning for you today.

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Wise Men's Star

Equipment: Felt tip pens, star shaped post-it notes or cut-out stars and sticky tape, a big sheet of dark blue or black paper.

Set-up: Securely attach the paper (night sky) to the wall and put the other equipment nearby.

Suggested Instructions: God put a star in the sky to help guide the wise men find Jesus. Is there something that you need guidance about? Is there something you need help with? If you want to, you can write a thought or prayer for help or guidance onto a star and stick it onto the night sky.

What gifts were given to Jesus. Are these suitable for a baby? Jesus was a special baby – many people believe he was the messiah promised to the Jews.

Going deeper

What do you think the meaning of these gifts was?

Respond

Encourage the pupils to respond with their own prayers first

Dear Lord,

thank you that you wanted both rich and poor to see baby Jesus.

Thank you that as we think about the visits of the wise men,

we are reminded that every person is important to you.

Please help us to use all the gifts that you have given to us.

Thank you for all the good things that you give.

When we go shopping for Christmas presents we want to make sure we have the right present for the right person...there's nothing more exciting than going to into a shop and seeing a present that is perfect for someone, to buy it and to excitedly see them open it on Christmas morning just like the little boy in the advert.

The reason that advert is so great is because most adverts tell us what we want...they are about feeding our desire for more stuff...but that advert tricks us...we believe at the beginning that the little boy is excited about getting to Christmas for his presents but on Christmas morning he walks straight past his own presents to give one to his parents...because that was what he was excited about.

Alternative approach

Matthew 2: 1-12 The Meeting Place Poem by Christopher Pilling It was the arrival of the kings that caught us unawares; we'd look in on the woman in the barn, curiosity you could call it, something to do on a cold winter's night; we'd wished her wellthat was the best we could do, she was in pain, and the next thing we knew she was lying on the straw —the little there was of it—and there was a baby in her arms. It was, as I say, the kings that caught us unawares... Women have babies every other day, not that we are there let's call it a common occurrence though, giving birth. But kings appearing in a stable with a 'Is this the place?' and kneeling, each with his gift held out towards the child! They didn't even notice us. Their robes trailed on the floor, rich, lined robes that money couldn't buy. What must this child be to bring kings from distant lands with costly incense and gold? And what were we to make of was it angels falling through the air, entwined and falling as if from the rafters to where the gaze of the kings met the child's —assuming the child could see? What would the mother do with the gifts? What would become of the child? And we'll never admit there are angels or that somewhere between one man's eye's and another's is a holy place, a space where a king could be at one with a child. at one with an astonished soldier.

Gathering

Once everyone is calm and the space is set up ready for worship you may want to start by lighting a candle.

Light the candle with these words: As we come together, we light this candle. If you are Christian, you may think the light is like Jesus, shining out everywhere. If you believe in God, you may think the light symbolises the presence of God in the world. If you are not sure about your beliefs, the flickering light may make you wonder about the existence of God. If you don't believe in God, the light may make you consider what meaning there is in the world. Or the candle may have a particular meaning for you today.

Saying / signing a greeting. Examples:

This is the day that the Lord has made. **Let us rejoice and be glad in it.**

Come on everyone! Clap your hands!

Shout to God with joyful praise!

The Lord is with us

Let us praise his name together

Grace, mercy and peace be with you and also with you.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you and also with you.

Reflection ideas for the classroom or outdoor area

Christmas Thanks

Equipment:

Christmas Tree. Red paper baubles, hole punched.

Pens to write on baubles. String to hang baubles.

Suggested Instructions:

Christmas is a time where we see family and friends; where we think about the year that has just gone by and the year to come. Take a moment to think of three things you can be thankful for that have happened since last Christmas. It might be passing an exam, getting into another school, winning a sporting event. Write the three things you are thankful for onto a Christmas bauble and hang it on the tree.



We have gathered here today to think about 'Thankfulness'

Engage

Read or retell dramatically the Nativity story from Luke 2. You could use puppets and/or a sensory box
